Alex Palacios Alex Palacios is Director of Special Projects at the Global Partnership for Education (GPE), the only multilateral partnership solely devoted to getting all children in school and receiving a quality education. His role is to help GPE strengthen and build key relationships in the United States, as well as enhance the reach and understanding of GPE within the business community, the foundation sector, and civil society/NGOs. Mr. Palacios was formerly Special Representative for the GAVI Alliance, whose mission is to save children's lives by increasing access to immunization in poor countries. His duties included coordination of GAVI's partnership with the governments of the United States, Canada, Mexico, the United Nations system, foundations and civil society organizations. He previously served as GAVI's Managing Director for External Relations. Prior to joining the GAVI Alliance, he served in senior positions at UNICEF. Mr. Palacios has also held several posts within the U.S. Government, including Deputy Assistant Administrator for Legislative and Public Affairs at the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID), Assistant General Counsel at the Peace Corps and at the Inter-American Foundation. From 1986 to 1993 he was the U. S. representative for UNICEF in Washington, DC. In this capacity he worked closely with the U.S. Congress and various administrations in relation to UNICEF's child survival and humanitarian response programs. An attorney, Mr. Palacios is a member of the District of Columbia Bar. He holds a BA in English and Anthropology from Amherst College and a JD from the Washington College of Law at American University.

Bobby John Dr. Bobby John is Executive Director of Global Health Advocates (formerly called Massive Effort Campaign). Global Health Advocates is a global non-profit organization that has been established to advocate for and catalyze the emergence of a social movement against AIDS, tuberculosis, malaria and other diseases of poverty. Dr. John originally trained in India as a physician with the Indian Armed Forces Medical College. He opted out of his Army commission and joined a small village hospital near Pune in Maharashtra State in western India. Dr. John worked for five years in the village as a combination surgeon and obstetrician. During these years, he was exposed to the hard realities of poverty, ill health, and the disasters of AIDS and TB. Subsequently, Dr. John set up and headed World Vision India's countrywide AIDS program. In 2002, he joined the Swiss-based Massive Effort Campaign as its Southeast Asia director, and subsequently became its president. He works closely with the numerous national governments and non-governmental agencies in the region to establish, fund, and manage transparent, comprehensive, national health and education programs aimed at eradicating AIDS, TB, and Malaria.

Bonita Cuff Bonita Cuff is a member of Witnesses to Hunger from Boston, Massachusetts. Witnesses to Hunger, a research and advocacy project of the Center for Hunger-Free Communities at Drexel University, features the voices and photography of caregivers who have experienced hunger and poverty firsthand. Members of Witnesses to Hunger work through their own photography, testimony, and expert advising to offer solutions and demand public accountability to break the cycle of poverty. Bonita joined Witnesses to Hunger in

2011. She is a mother of five, ranging in age from 6 to 26. A very strong and wise woman, Bonita talks a lot about her family and the life she wants for them. She is currently looking for employment to better her life and the lives of her children. Through her photos, Bonita explains her struggles with food and shows the experience of going to the food pantry. Dr. Jim Yong Kim Jim Yong Kim, M.D., Ph.D., became the 12th President of the World Bank Group on July 1, 2012. A physician and anthropologist, Dr. Kim has dedicated himself to international development for more than two decades, helping to improve the lives of under-served populations worldwide. Dr. Kim comes to the Bank after serving as President of Dartmouth College, a pre-eminent center of higher education that consistently ranks among the top academic institutions in the United States. Dr. Kim is a co-founder of Partners In Health (PIH) and a former director of the HIV/AIDS Department at the World Health Organization (WHO). As President of Dartmouth – an institution that comprises a liberal arts college and professional schools of medicine, engineering and business, as well as 19 graduate programs in the arts and sciences, a staff and faculty of 3,300, and a budget of \$700 million – Dr. Kim earned praise for reducing a financial deficit without cutting any academic programs. Dr. Kim also founded the Dartmouth Center for Health Care Delivery Science, a multidisciplinary institute dedicated to developing new models of health care delivery and achieving better health outcomes at lower costs. Before assuming the Dartmouth presidency, Dr. Kim held professorships and chaired departments at Harvard Medical School, the Harvard School of Public Health and Brigham and Women's Hospital, Boston. He also served as director of Harvard's François-Xavier Bagnoud Center for Health and Human Rights. In 1987, Dr. Kim co-founded Partners In Health, a Boston-based non-profit organization now working in poor communities on 4 continents. Challenging previous conventional wisdom that drug-resistant tuberculosis and HIV/AIDS could not be treated in developing countries, PIH successfully tackled these diseases by integrating large-scale treatment programs into community-based primary care. As Director of the World Health Organization's HIV/AIDS Department, Dr. Kim led the '3 by 5' initiative, the first-ever global goal for AIDS treatment, which sought to treat 3 million new HIV/AIDS patients in developing countries with antiretroviral drugs by 2005. Launched in September 2003, the ambitious program ultimately reached its goal by 2007. Dr. Kim's work has earned him wide recognition. He was awarded a MacArthur "Genius" Fellowship (2003), was named one of America's "25 Best Leaders" by U.S. News & World Report (2005), and was selected as one of TIME magazine's "100 Most Influential People in the World" (2006). Born in 1959 in Seoul, South Korea, Dr. Kim moved with his family to the United States at the age of five and grew up in Muscatine,

Iowa. Dr. Kim graduated with an A.B. magna cum laude from Brown University in 1982. He earned an M.D. from Harvard Medical School in 1991 and a Ph.D. in anthropology from Harvard University in 1993. **@WorldBank**

Joyce Matogo Joyce Matogo is the grassroots manager for KANCO. Joyce is a Social Practitioner currently working within the Kenyan context to bring change in Kenya's health policy environment. Joyce has previous work experience in high level advocacy at Health NGOs Network and Kenya Alcohol Policy Alliance. These roles were mainly geared towards coalition strengthening and increasing civil society's participation in Health Systems Strengthening. Julia Gillard Julia Gillard comes to the Global Partnership for Education after a distinguished career of public service in Australia. She served as Prime Minister of Australia between 2010 and 2013 and successfully managed Australia's economy during the global economic crisis. Education is Ms. Gillard's passion. She reformed Australia's education at every level, from early childhood to higher education, with a special focus on disadvantaged children. She delivered new standards to improve the quality of childcare and access to early childhood education for every Australian child. She developed a needs-based funding system for every school and ensured that funding was tied to a quality improvement agenda of better teaching, individual learning plans and parental engagement. Ms. Gillard also established Australia's first national curriculum and ensured significant investment in school buildings. Before becoming Prime Minister, Ms. Gillard was Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Education, Employment and Workplace Relations and Social Inclusion. From 2003 to 2006, Ms. Gillard served as Shadow Minister for Health followed in 2006 by an appointment as Shadow Minister for Employment and Industrial Relations and Social Inclusion. In 2003, Ms. Gillard took on responsibilities for Reconciliation and Indigenous Affairs. She was appointed Shadow Minister for Population and Immigration in 2001. Previously, from 1998 to 2000, Ms. Gillard was a member of the House of Representatives' Standing Committee on Employment, Education and Workplace Relations. From 1996 to 1998, Ms. Gillard served as Chief-of-Staff to the Opposition Leader of the State of Victoria. Prior to entering politics, Ms. Gillard worked as a solicitor in Melbourne with the law firm Slater and Gordon and became a partner in 1990. Ms. Gillard retired from political life following the 2013 Australian national election. **@JuliaGillard**

Kul Gautam Mr. Kul Chandra Gautam is a distinguished international civil servant, development professional, public policy expert, and human rights activist. Previously he was Deputy Executive Director of UNICEF and Assistant Secretary-General of the United Nations. He has extensive experience in international diplomacy, development cooperation, and humanitarian assistance. As a senior UNICEF official, Mr.

Gautam provided leadership for strategic planning, policy guidance, and program management. He coordinated inter-agency collaboration and public-private partnerships for child rights and human development among UN agencies, donors, and civil society organizations. At the global level, Mr. Gautam dealt with the highest levels of policy making at the United Nations. Mr. Gautam was the key senior UNICEF officer responsible for drafting the Declaration and Plan of Action of the 1990 World Summit for Children, the largest gathering of world leaders in history until that time. In 2002 he led the organization of another major United Nations conference – the Special Session of the General Assembly on Children – attended by 70 world leaders and thousands of child rights activists and civil society leaders, including celebrities and Nobel Prize Laureates. Currently, Mr. Gautam serves on the boards of several international development and charitable organizations and public-private partnerships, and is the former chair of the Partnership for Maternal, Newborn and Child Health and the Micronutrient Initiative. Mr. Gautam has been named as one of a select group of prominent "Global Leaders in Education" by Global Partnership for Education (GPE), helping the GPE to raise the profile of education in the global development agenda. Mr. Gautam informally advises Nepal's senior political and civil society leadership on the peace process, consolidation of democracy and socio-economic development.

LaNae Havens LaNae Havens was born in Las Vegas New Mexico in 1975. As a child, she lived in Grants, NM and Milan, NM while her dad worked in the uranium mines, then settled in Albuquerque when her dad started a Solar business. As adult, she and her son faced serious financial challenges after becoming a single parent, relying on public assistance and local charities, like St. Vincent De Paul. St. Vincent's connected LaNae to Circles USA in Albuquerque, a program that provides ongoing support for helping families rise out of poverty. As a single mother of a 10 year old, she is now attending college, studying Economics and Political Science in hopes of becoming a speech writer. She also served as a Coaching Intern with Circle's NM and is a volunteer with RESULTS Albuquerque U.S. Poverty Group. Circles USA and RESULTS recently formed a partnership to pursue Big View strategies on how to remove systemic barriers to prosperity; LaNae is now helping foster that partnership as the Big View intern at Circles. Marian Wright Edelman Marian Wright Edelman, Founder and President of the Children's Defense Fund, has been an advocate for disadvantaged Americans for her entire professional life. A graduate of Spelman College and Yale Law School, Edelman was the first black woman admitted to the Mississippi Bar and directed the NAACP Legal Defense and Educational Fund office in Jackson, Mississippi. She has received over a hundred honorary degrees and many awards including the Albert Schweitzer Humanitarian Prize, the Heinz Award, a MacArthur Foundation Prize Fellowship, the Presidential Medal of Freedom, the nation's highest civilian award, and the Robert F. Kennedy Lifetime Achievement Award for her writings which include: *Families in Peril: An Agenda for Social Change; The Measure of Our Success: A Letter to My Children and Yours, Lanterns: A Memoir of*

Michael Blake When describing the path his life has taken, Michael Blake humbly refers to the words of his mother who remarked that the family had gone, “from no house to the White House.” Blake has committed himself to the empowerment of others like him, who may not have direct access to opportunities to participate in the policy and political debates that shape this nation. He currently serves as the Director of Public Policy and External Affairs for Green for All. Additionally he serves as Senior Advisor for Operation Hope. In addition, Mike Blake announced his candidacy the 78th Assembly District in the Bronx. Poverty within the Bronx has been a cornerstone of his campaign. Michael served as the Senior Advisor for the Office of Public Engagement for President Obama’s 2013 Presidential Inaugural Committee. Prior to that appointment, he served as the National Deputy Director of Operation Vote for President Obama’s 2012 re-election, Blake oversaw the constituency outreach programs for the Obama for America campaign and helped expand the diverse electorate who voted for President Obama. Blake started his political career in Michigan, as the Director of External Affairs for the Michigan House of Representatives serving in Michigan Speaker of the House Andy Dillon’s cabinet, where he successfully co-organized three state house campaigns in the 2006 election cycle. Blake first met President Obama in 2006 when he joined the Obama organization as a participant in the “Yes We Can” political training program, which trained ten young Americans to run and execute a political campaign. His affiliation with Obama would continue through the 2008 Obama for America campaign, in which Blake worked in eight states over 20 months, starting as the Iowa Deputy Political Director and Constituency Outreach Director and ending as the Michigan Deputy Director and Political Director. Following the campaign, Blake joined the White House staff as Associate Director of Public Engagement & Deputy Associate Director of the Office of Intergovernmental Affairs, coordinating African American, Minority Business and county elected official outreach. He created the White House Urban Entrepreneurship Summit series, which sought to foster public, private and not-for-profit partnerships and provide strategic advice to attendees. Blake was honored as one of “The Root 100” in 2012; featured in Jet magazine as one of 15 black politicians behind President Obama’s re-election; and recognized by MSNBC in 2011 as one of the Top 10 Black Politicians on the rise. Michael Gerson Michael Gerson is a nationally syndicated columnist who appears twice weekly in the Washington Post. Bush as Assistant to the President for Policy and Strategic Planning. He was a key administration advocate for the President’s Emergency Plan for AIDS Relief (PEPFAR), the President’s Malaria Initiative (PMI), the fight against global sex trafficking, and funding for women’s justice and empowerment issues. Prior to that appointment, he served in the White House as Deputy Assistant to the President and Director of Presidential Speechwriting and Assistant to the President for Speechwriting and Policy Advisor. Gerson joined Bush’s presidential campaign in early 1999 as chief speechwriter and a senior policy adviser. He was previously a senior editor covering politics at U.S. News and World Report. Gerson was a speechwriter and policy adviser for Jack Kemp and a speechwriter for Bob Dole during the 1996 presidential campaign. He has also served Senator Dan Coats of Indiana as Policy Director. Gerson is a graduate of Wheaton College in Illinois. He grew up in the St. Louis area and now lives with his wife and sons in northern Virginia. @MJGerson

Michael Gwaba Michael Gwaba is grassroots manager for CITAM+. Living openly with HIV, Michael has been on treatment for 13 years now and continues to work with different communities to help save lives of people living with HIV and those affected by Tuberculosis and Malaria. Prior to joining CITAM+, Michael worked for Afya Mzuri as Community Coordinator where he was responsible for two USAID funded projects on Behavior Change and Social Mobilization and a DFID project where he was on the IEC development team. He is also a trainer of trainers in advocacy and is a seasoned community journalist who has covered many conferences on behalf of the Health Development Network (HDN).

Randi Schmidt Randi Carmen Schmidt is the executive director of the Children’s Leadership Council, a coalition of leading policy and advocacy organizations that are working every day to improve the health, education and well-being of children and youth in order to prepare them for school, work, and life. Randi brings over sixteen years of advocacy experience to the CLC on a wide range of issues. the devastating 2010 earthquake in Port-au-Prince, Haiti; co-chaired the State Department's first review of American diplomacy and development operations; and now spearheads President Barack Obama's landmark Feed the Future food security initiative. He is also leading "USAID Forward," an extensive set of reforms to USAID's business model focusing on seven key areas, including procurement, science & technology, and monitoring & evaluation. Before becoming USAID's Administrator, Shah served as undersecretary for research, education and economics, and as chief scientist at the U.S. Department of Agriculture. At USDA, he launched the National Institute of Food and Agriculture, which significantly elevated the status and funding of agricultural research.
